

# **LESSON PLAN: WHAT TIME IS IT?**

- Age: from age 7
- Learning area: math
- Preparation time: 5 min
- Duration: 30 45 min



#### WHAT DO YOU NEED?

- Air-drying clay in two colours such as Creall Do & Dry
- Skewers
- Clay tools
- Clay roller
- Round object of approx. 15 cm diameter

#### WHAT WILL YOU BE DOING?

You are going to clay your own clock. That's how you learn to tell the time.






#### **STEP 1**

Look carefully at the example. What do you see?

Roll out one colour of clay with the clay roller. Cut out the clockface with the round object.



#### **STEP 2**

With the clay tool, carve the numbers of the clock in the right place. Stick a wooden skewer in the middle of the dial.

You can also write your name on the dial.



#### **STEP 3**

Roll out the second colour of clay. Use this to make the hands of the clock. Make sure that one hand is longer than the other. Also make sure that the hands are not too big for your clock.

Use the clay tool to prick a hole in the ends of the hands.



#### **STEP 4**


Place the pointers on the skewer. You can now move the hands to tell the time.

Practice! What time is it in the example on the right? And what time is it on your clock?
